NEW TASK FORCE TO SEEK, VET WORTHY PROJECTS FOR BRANCH

Since its founding in 1923, the Branch has made some very significant contributions to the Austin community including the establishment of the Austin Public Library in 1926; the establishment of an endowment fund at the University of Texas that was completed in 1992; the founding in 1941 of the Austin Community Nursery Schools (now Mainspring Schools); the establishment of a Travis County Literacy Council (now Literacy Austin) in 1983; and became a cosponsor in 1990 of Expanding Your Horizons in Science and

Mathematics. These accomplishments are now mature, and it is time to turn our attention to some endeavors for the twenty-first century.

this effort. The task force will

2012-2013 seeking worthy

PROPOSAL TO BRING STEM EXHIBITION TO AUSTIN

Here, There, and Everywhere (HTE) is a NASAfunded program that consists of a series of exhibitions, posters, and supporting hands-on activities that utilize analogies in the teaching of science, engineering, and technology (STEM) to provide multigenerational and family friendly content in both English and Spanish. Mary Ellen Scribner and Adrian McCulloch worked with Bernadette Phifer, the culture and education manager of the George Washington Carver Museum and Cultural Center, to write a proposal to bring the exhibition to Austin in the spring of 2013. If the proposal is accepted, the exhibition venue will be the Carver Cultural Center, and the Center and the Branch will work together to maximize the effectiveness of the exhibition in the Central Texas Area.

FELLOWSHIP RECIPIENTS DAZZLE MEMBERS WITH DESCRIPTIONS OF RESEARCH

Speakers for the May program were three of the four recipients of \$2,500 fellowships from the Branch this year. Each one presented an overview of the research she doing in pursuit of a PhD as Branch members listened intently to the fascinating details of what each hopes to achieve.

Andrea Gustavson is analyzing snapshots taken by military men and women to see how they construct their own visual archives of war. Her American studies dissertation title is "What Comes Home: Vernacular Photography and the Cold War, 1945 - 1991."

Beibie Zou is at the LBJ School of Public Affairs and is focusing on insurance regulation. Title insurance is the charge added to the cost of buying a home to insure the title of the property is clear and good, and her research looks at title insurance as it is handled by five states. Her dissertation is "Regulation versus Competition: How Regulation Explains Price Variation in Title Insurance among States."

Marisa Miller wants to improve the productivity of food crops. Hybrids show increased growth vigor when compared to their parents, but the molecular mechanism for the increased vigor is relatively unknown. Her dissertation is entitled "Regulation of Circadian Rhythms and Growth Vigor in Arabidopsis Hybrids and Polyploids."

Shahana Kurshid, whose research is in the field of civil, architectural and environmental engineering, was unable to be present.
