

Meanwhile in March, there is much to recognize and celebrate also. WOMEN'S HISTORY MONTH IN AUSTIN

Exhibits, Lectures, and Discussion Groups on Women at The Bullock Texas State History Museum

The Bullock Texas State History Museum has two exhibits on women of interest to members of AAUW. The first exhibit, titled "Women Shaping Texas in the 20th Century" highlights the contributions of Texas women in the fields of business, education, civil rights, healthcare, government, the arts, and preservation of both nature and historic landmarks. There are pictures, recordings, apparel, and documents that bring to life the accomplishments of these women. The website states that this exhibit is the first major exhibit in thirty years to focus on the impact women have had on the development of Texas.

The second exhibit," Enduring Women: Photography and Oral History," features women who are ranchers in various parts of the state. Photographs of the women and their ranches are matched with recordings in which each rancher describes her personal experiences and the challenges faced in continuing the stewardship. Both exhibits will be on view through May 19, 2013.

Two different series of discussions on women, the In Her Own Words lecture series and the Conversation. series, complement the exhibits. The former consists of four formal lectures that run from March through May. The presenter will be Dr. Ann Stuart,

chancellor and president of Texas Women's University. She has won accolades for increasing enrollment and for constructing new facilities that offer programs in science, technology, engineering, and mathematics. The other three lectures are:

Texas Lonestars's Project Princess

In another email received via the website, U.T. student Kathryn Middlebrook reached out to AAUW members on behalf of Project Princess. She writes, "I am a part of a service organization on campus called Texas Lonestars and also the assistant to the chair of our philanthropy, Project Princess. Project Princess is a registered non-profit charity that helps underprivileged, central Texas high school girls go to their proms by alleviating the heavy cost this event requires. We accomplish this feat by collecting gently used or new donations of dresses, shoes, accessories, and more throughout the year that are then given to girls on our annual Boutique Weekend held in the spring. We also collect donations in the form of gift cards from local restaurants, hair salons, florists, etc. that are raffled off to girls throughout the Boutique Day. Our motto is 'Every girl deserves to be a Princess' and we strive all year long to raise not only funds, but awareness for our cause. Project Princess began in 2002 helping a total of 10 girls and after many years of growth, we ended 2012 Spring Boutique Weekend having helped approximately 350 girls!
