WOMEN'S HISTORY MONTH/INTERNATIONAL WOMEN'S DAY SPEAKER IS MELISSA SIMPLER



Melissa Simpler, the co-founder and CEO of Affinegy, Inc., is the perfect choice for a Women's History Month and International Women's Day speaker. She is a successful engineer and businesswoman, a wife (husband is Jeff Simpler) and mother of two sons (nine-year-old Clark and four-year-old Graham), and our own Gail Simpler's daughter-in-law. She has a BSEE, cum laude, and MBA from the University of Texas and is a frequent guest speaker for the UT College of Engineering and Girlstart, an NPO devoted to mo-

tivating girls to pursue and enjoy math and science. She co-founded Affinegy in March of 2003, and as CEO, has provided the vision for ease-of-use that is the foundation for Affinegy's Digital Lifestyle solutions. Melissa also led the company's initial customer acquisition and business development initiatives, establishing relationships with some of the world's largest broadband service providers, and setting the stage for the company's expansion into channel relationships across the Digital Lifestyle market ecosystem. She has also served as Member Renewal Chair of the Austin Wireless Alliance and on the board of UT's Executive Alumni Association. Melissa is grateful for the family and friends that surround and support her family in the Austin area and for her wonderful extended church family at Good Shepherd Episcopal.

For the focus of her presentation on March 13, Melissa will expand on Dolly Parton's statement, "If you want the rainbow, you've got to put up with the rain." She will talk about the importance of having a dream, doing what fuels your passion, the importance of persistence in reaching your goals, and sometimes having patience also. Her topic dovetails nicely with AAUW's 2010-2011 *Position on Balancing Work and Life: Family Friendly Workplace Policies*. Despite the relative wealth of the United States, family oriented workplace policies in this country lag dramatically behind those in much of the rest of the word, including all high-income countries and many middle- and low-income countries as well. While American workplace policies have lagged, the past fifty years have seen substantial changes in the composition of the American workforce. Two-thirds (64 percent) of women with children under six are in the labor force. Nationwide, 22.9 million families

RESERVATIONS, DIRECTIONS, LUNCHEON MENU

Reservation reminders are sent electronically by **Dorothy Berasley** one week before the meeting; you can simply reply to her e-mail or you can telephone her at 343-0370 to make your reservation. Whichever method you choose, she must receive reservations or cancellations by 7 p.m. on the Wednesday before the Saturday meeting.

The menu for the luncheon this month includes lasagna, seasonal fresh vegetables, a salad, bread, dessert, and tea and/or coffee. The cost is \$20 for a timely reservation with payment to be made the day of the luncheon; a check is preferred or you need to have the correct change. The Branch must pay for all reservations made, so a member who does not keep a reservation or make a timely cancellation will be billed for the full coast of the luncheon. If a member arrives without a reservation and expects to eat lunch, the cost of the meal is \$30. In this situation, please check in with Dorothea (reservations) and **Evelyn Boyer** (treasurer) at the registration table to determine availability and to make payment; do not approach hotel staff directly as this is a business transaction to be handled by the treasurer.

By the 6 p.m. Wednesday deadline, Dorothea also needs to know if you are attending the program but not staying for lunch or if your luncheon reservation has any special dietary requirements such as a vegetarian meal. Seating for member attending only the meeting/program is in chairs set up separately for those at the luncheon tables, so it is important to let Dorothea know that you will be attending the program even if you are not staying for the luncheon. The March 13 meeting will be at the Wyndham Hotel as all our meetings are this year. Remaining program dates are April 10 and May 8.

SPOTLIGHT ON THE LIGHT CUISINE GROUP

The Light Cuisine Group had fun discussing its origins at our January meeting. We looked through old AAUW directories and found that light cuisine was called International Light Cuisine in 1988 and met at the home of Hildegard Everett with everyone cooking. It took more time to get through the lunch, including clean up, with everyone participating! They also had a theme for each year. One member used the words "extreme" and "intense" when describing the focus on non-fat and low calorie because in the 80s there were not as many products available that fit that description. Recipes had to be modified and did not always yield great taste. In 1990 the Light Cuisine Group cooked low calorie, healthy food from different parts of the United States; i.e. Cajun, New England, North East Texas, etc., and started meeting in the homes of different members each month. The 1992 directory defined Light Cuisine as using recipes "that meet the concerns of today's weight conscious, health-minded cooks" and also used a theme for the year. The description of the group remained the same; however, it made us smile when the theme for 1993 was simply "Not Chicken Again!" The theme for 1994 was "Surprise" and then a "Quick & Easy" theme for 1995. For 1996 to 1999 the theme was "Adventurous (Remarkable, Exciting Experiences) Dining." In 1999 the group added going out to restaurants some months, as well as meeting in members' homes, with a suggestion that menus be "light."



Our current group has lots of fun, as well as eating healthy meals together once a month. We have a hostess and a co-hostess for each month and make the "light" recipes available to the group's members. We do not have themes, but we always have fun, laughter, and great conversations. It is much easier to cook healthy with the products available today. Here is one of our favorite recipes:

Easy Cranberry Orange Fat Free High Fiber Muffins

- 1 package Krusteaz (brand) Fat Free Cranberry Orange Muffin Mix
- 2 cups All Bran cereal and 2 1/4 cups water
- 5 packets Equal or Splenda

Mix together All Bran cereal and water; let soak for ½ hour. Then add the dry muffin mix, the can of fruit-including juice--from the mix, and the sweetener. Spray muffin pans with no-calorie fat free cooking spray and fill ½ full to make 24 muffins. Bake at 400 degrees for 15-20 minutes. -- 50 calories each


