Noted Art Historian and Lecturer, Dr. Karen Pope, will present a program based on her Famous Collectors Series. Peggy Guggenheim 1898-1979, was very much ahead of her time and generation. At only 14 years old, she lost her father, Benjamin Guggenheim, in the 1912 sinking of the RMS Titanic.

As a young woman, Peggy moved to London and opened an art gallery in 1938, but was forced to leave London with the outbreak of WW II. She returned to New York, and in 1949, purchased the *Palazzo Venier dei Leoni* on the Grand Canal in Venice. Peggy would become famous as a collector of 20th century art and vowed to "buy a picture a day". She had the "eye" and the resources from the Guggenheim fortune to accomplish this goal. She continued to live in the palazzo for 30 years and exhibit art until her death in 1979. Today, the museum continues to grow and exhibit the major movements of modern art.



Brewer's BUZZzzzz

The **September 9th AAUW Austin Branch Meeting** was the first meeting of member year 2016-17, and **Co-President Marina Rivers' husband, CPA Wendell Harwell,** presented a captivating portrait of *Living in China* from a savvy American point of view. The PowerPoint presentation moved briskly to Harwell's confident and organized talk of living in Shanghai and traveling extensively in the East. His photos compared the way Americans in Shanghai are able to live *vis-à-vis* the way ordinary Chinese citizens live. He showed high regard for the daily challenges met by the Chinese to provide the best possible education for their one child. An interesting side note on the changing one-child law in China was the realization of the burden of family responsibilities on that single grown child to house, feed, and clothe the older generations who, by custom, continue to live with the young. Therefore, in a new marriage, a couple would provide for both sets of parents, plus the older sets of parents. Another eye-opener for us was the extreme challenge Chinese parents face in gaining access to higher education for their children. The Chinese child does no sports or play, just study study study. The competition is fierce. He concluded that all people want the same basic things: enough food, peace, security, and a life free of fear.

The Harwells especially loved learning from brilliant Chinese tutors, travel, their spacious apartment, and the FOOD. These foodies love to adventure-dine and never became ill (except via a Chinese KFC). The program was enlightening and highly entertaining. The 54 members and multiple guests in attendance loved the presentation and the very nice lunch. **Membership VP Elaine Penn** welcomed new member **Suellen Myers** to our branch and recognized seven other NEW members in attendance: **Roberta Coffin, Brenda Hahne, Sylvia Huntsman, Lana Kempff, Jennifer Swenson**, and **sisters Jan** and **Pam Watson. Co-President Marsha Endahl Kramer** introduced our three brand new Honorary members who were in attendance: **Myrtle Bell, Anita Knight, and Mary Ellen Scribner.** Longtime Honoraries **Jerry Cassidy** and **Nancy Myers** were also introduced. **Sunshine chair Larie Amsler** gave a touching tribute on the passing of Honorary member **Dr. Janice May.**

On October 12, 2016, AAUW Austin met on the very timely topic of *Texas Voters, Trends, and Issues.* Program planner Sylvia Garcia introduced our two speakers, Cinde Weatherby, President of the Austin League of Women Voters, and Grace Chimene, of the State Board of the League of Women Voters. Both came prepared to inform us of the sorry state of voter participation in most of Texas. The Central Texas area is the exception; Travis County's Tax Assessor/Collector Bruce Elfant has registered 90% of eligible voters! Weatherby said surrounding counties Bastrop and Williamson also have good percentages. Ease of registration plus the many voting stations in our area result in many Central Texans showing up at the polls. In other parts of Texas, registering and voting are intimidating for many would-be voters and difficult to accomplish due to fewer places to cast one's vote. Weatherby lauded the success of Bruce Elfant and his staff. The League's next goal is to enable voters to register online. This would be more accurate and doable.

They showed graphs of the disparity of voting among the well-to-do and the poor from year to year, and the inevitable spike in voter participation during presidential elections. Weatherby also said numbers improve when peers simply encourage a friend or relative to vote. We were all very interested in what they had to say; many members participated in the question and answer period. It is frustrating that this citizen's right and responsibility is not taken more seriously; on the other hand, pols have made it very challenging for many sectors of our population to manage this important constitutional right. This past week *The Statesman* exposed how gerrymandering has made the large Hispanic population in South Texas almost voiceless.

Co-President **Marina Rivers** then presented the budget and shared her excitement about our **November 15th** meeting on a TUESDAY, at Westwood Country Club with the inimitable **Dr. Karen Pope** discussing the vast contributions to the art world made by philanthropist and bohemian collector Peggy Guggenheim. Dr. Pope is a nationally recognized authority and art historian who conducts *ArtinSight* lectures and tours to happy devotées on a regular basis. Co-President and Funds co-chair **Marsha Endahl Kramer** proudly announced that branch contributions to FUNDS had reached over \$4000 for fiscal year 2016. She collected quite a few checks. Latinitas liaison **Lilac Bauer** gave us an update about volunteer needs coming up. **Inés Garcia** was on hand to distribute more yearbooks, and she and sister **Tulis Escobar** will soon take off for Israel. Membership VP **Elaine Penn** welcomed guest and new Austinite **Gail Rusk**, **CPA**, and Georgetown member **Pat Rehm**, both of whom joined our branch at the meeting! She also recognized Honorary members **Jerry Cassidy** and **Nancy Myers** in attendance. The buffet which followed was delicious!

The meeting was attended by 48 members and guests, plus many of our newest members, such as **Pam Watson**, **Roberta Coffin**, soon to graduate **Sara Huff**, **Katherine Staples**, **Lea Masiello**, **Mary Humke**, and **Brenda Hahne**. **Ginny Tannebring** came from Wimberly, and many of our members enabled others to attend by car-sharing.

FIRST IN THEIR CLASS

UT honoring first black undergraduates 60 years later

Peggy Holland and her husband Col. Leon Holland, ret., were the focus of an article in the *Statesman* discussing the University of Texas and its racist past; they were pioneers in enrolling - he in 1956, she in 1958. Much has changed in the past 60 years at UT, but the problem of racism is still lingering in this country. Peggy is a longtime member of AAUW Austin, a past Membership VP, awesome bridge player, lovely friend, and member of the art tour group, PEARS, Culture & Cuisine, and others.

PEGGY DRAKE HOLLAND: Enrolled in 1958 and now married to Leon Holland, she had more trouble with professors than students.



The Austin Branch of AAUW has been privileged to watch our favorite twins **Kavya** and **Priya Ramamoorthy** grow from being part of an 8th grade team of girls, including Maanasa Nathan and Smrithi Mahadevan, who were recognized National Endowment for the Humanities Scholars in 2012 in the National History Competition, to achieve numerous other honors before graduation from high school in Round Rock ISD.

Their lives were deeply affected by the knowledge that Title IX guarantees gender equality to all students and that the VOTE empowers women to achieve their goals. They went on to compete in the National History Competition each year they were in school. During their high school years they also conducted STEM robotics/code workshops with Latinitas, participated in debate competitions, presented their views to a branch meeting of the Austin AAUW, won the prestigious Girl Scout Gold Award, created a website, **teenempower.com**, and presented at two Women's Empowerment Conferences. They are passionate about using the laws in place to break down barriers and encourage girls to reach higher. Kavya and Priya have been named International Baccalaureate Diploma holders.

Moving on to the University of Texas this fall, these twin daughters of AAUW's website manager Janani Janakiraman, and sisters of UT Plan II graduate and AAUW member Divya Ramamoorthy, became student e-affiliates and then joined the Austin Branch. Priya is pursuing a degree in Public Health and Kavya is focusing on Computer Science. Now they are putting their tireless energy and talents into growing the AAUW Student Organization here, working with National AAUW and C/U Partner and UT Dean, Dr. Soncia Reagins-Lilly to get the organization fully registered and viable. Among the goals of these FRESHMAN students are increasing the e-affiliate membership and interest in AAUW, promoting student awareness of AAUW resources, and ultimately hosting a conference like StartSmart for women student leaders in Central Texas colleges.

Girls like Priya and Kavya are the future of AAUW, our means of remaining relevant and forceful in the years ahead. It is AAUW Austin's privilege to count them both as our own. They feel lucky that they were able to have the support of local AAUW branches in all their empowerment and advocacy endeavors. Kavya said it has truly been a blessing to be part of such a welcoming and supportive community, and they are so excited to bring this to UT. Kavya even applied for the AAUW National Student Advisory Council, and we expect she will represent us there someday soon. We hope they keep up the good fight!
