Fred Burton: "Global Security Outlook: Counterterrorism in Today's World"
Mr. Fred Burton, one of the world's foremost authorities on security and terrorism, who as Vice President of Intelligence and Chief Security Officer oversees Stratfor's analysis of global security developments, will address the topic of "Global Security Outlook: Counterterrorism in Today’s World".

Mr. Burton is the author of three books, including the best-selling memoir, GHOST: Confessions of a Counterterrorism Agent (Random House, 2008), in which he tells the story of his role in the fight against the burgeoning terrorist threat in the 1980s and beyond. Mr. Burton has been featured as a terrorism and security expert in numerous media outlets, and we are lucky to hear him in person!

On October 18, the Program Administrator of IBM Corporate Citizenship and Corporate Affairs wrote to tell us that a cash grant of $\$ 2,000.00$ has been approved to support American Association of University Women, Inc.'s STEM Programs.
