Professor Brenner: Journalism in the Era of Fake News

"Believe nothing you hear, and only one half that you see" is usually attributed to a character in one of Edgar Allan Poe's macabre stories. We will receive a far more measured view from our October speaker's experiences in what is now being called an era of "fake news." R.B. Brenner is the G.B. Dealey Regents Professor and the Director of the School of Journalism at the University of Texas. Prior to coming to UT, he was Deputy Director of Journalism at Stanford University. An Oberlin College graduate, he began his reporting career at the Winston-Salem Journal and soon moved to The Washington Post, where his roles included Metropolitan Editor, Sunday Editor, Deputy Universal News Editor and Maryland Editor. He was one of the primary editors of the newspaper's coverage of the Virginia Tech shootings, which was



awarded a Pulitzer Prize in 2008. At the *Post* he also played a leadership role in merging the digital and print newsrooms.

AAUW has been actively involved with promoting STEM education and careers, as well as advocating for educational and economic equity, for women and girls since its beginnings. In the 1990s the Austin branch implemented opportunities for girls in grades 6-8 to participate in STEM hands-on activities with professional women in STEM with our one-day *Expanding your Horizons* Conference.

Since the 2000s, we have volunteered with two non-profits wholly dedicated to bringing hands-on STEM/STEAM education to 4th - 8th grade girls in After School Programs, Summer Day Camps, and Saturday STEM Days throughout the school year. Rachel Muir was a young woman looking for an opportunity with an organization with just such a vision. She fund-raised and founded Girlstart, which is now going national under the current leadership of AAUW member **Dr. Tamara Hudgins** and the dedicated Girlstart staff.

Latinitas was the creation of two UT Austin graduate students, Laura Donnelly and Alicia Rascon, who looked for a way to improve the image and self-esteem of young Latinas. They used media and technology to develop an online magazine created by and for young Latinas. They too have used the model of after school clubs, summer camps and STEAM Saturdays to incorporate music media, photography and film, online technology, entrepreneurship, and computer coding, with an extra emphasis on literacy, to encourage the girls in the East and South Austin areas, and El Paso.

The Austin Branch of AAUW has a strong STEM committee whose members had their first meeting in August. We are working on volunteer opportunities for AAUW members in STEM and STEAM with upper elementary and middle school girls. The model works. Those changes that I mentioned at the beginning? They happen at Mainspring. Every day, we see first-hand the progress shown by our kids, from regulating behavior to learning executive function to making good decisions to building quality relationships and more.

This is how we help our community. As steward of this wonderful school, I'm thrilled to be working with you to bring real change, one precious child at a time.
