

## Dr. Collette Pierce Burnette, "My Journey to the Presidency"

Dr. Colette Pierce Burnette, an experienced leader in higher education with a deep commitment to student success, will share her journey from working for several corporations to having her own computer consulting firm to several higher education positions to finally becoming the first female President and Chief Executive Officer of the merged Huston-Tillotson University (and only the second female president in the institution's 140-year history).

Huston-Tillotson University Board of Trustees announced Colette Pierce Burnette as the institution's sixth President and Chief Executive Officer, effective July 1, 2015.

Dr. Burnette has a vast experience serving on boards and committees

with various companies, colleges, and community organizations. At one time, she was a member of AAUW. She is married to Dr. Daarel Burnette, and they have two adult children, Daarel II of Washington, DC and Daana of New York, New York.

### http://storybookproject.org/ Connecting children with their incarcerated moms through the joy of literature.



Storybook Project of Texas builds relationships between mothers behind bars and their children on the outside. Volunteers record the mothers reading books to their children. The mothers also include a short message. The children receive a copy of the recording and a new book each month. Since 2003, WSP has added prisons and mothers to its program. In 2014, six prisons and approximately 2,500 women were participating.

Inside Books Project is an Austin-based community service volunteer organization that sends free books and


educational materials to prisoners in Texas. Inside Books is the only **books-to-prisoners program** in Texas, where over 140,000 people are incarcerated. Inside Books Project works to promote reading, literacy, and education among incarcerated individuals and to educate the general public on issues of incarceration.

**Susan James** suggests we could collect books to donate, even if we did not volunteer to open letters from inmates, select books to best fit the request, and make packages of books to send back to each inmate.

### Mary Catherine Bateson wrote:

"I like to think of women as artists of their own lives - working with what comes to hand through accident or talent, to compose and recompose a pattern in time that expresses who they are and what they believe in, making meaning even as they are studying and working and raising children, creating and recreating themselves......

So, as you get up in the morning, as you make decisions, as you spend money, make friends, make commitments, you are creating a piece of art called your life."
