## **African American Book Festival**

The AAUW table at the African American Book Festival, which was held at the George Washington Carver Museum and Library on June 24, caught the attention of a number of women attending the festival. Mary Ellen Scribner and Ginny Tannebring, joined by Anita Knight in the morning, were kept busy answering questions about AAUW and conversing about a variety of topics of concern to the women who stopped at the table. A surprising number spoke about the student debt crisis, telling personal stories and saying that black women are the most severely impacted. The fate of Title IX was another concern because as one woman said, "Guess it is going to go away now." Equal pay and education in general were on the minds of everyone. 24 names and emails have been passed to Linda Welsh, membership vice president, and all will be invited to the summer social. We also talked to women from California, Kansas City, Georgetown, and Killeen and told them how to find a branch near their homes.

## Happy Birthday, Title IX!

On June 23, 2017, Title IX turned 45! Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972 was the first comprehensive federal law to prohibit sex discrimination in education, and covers women, men, girls, boys, staff, and students in any educational institution or program that receives federal funding.

We've made a lot of progress in gender equity since Title IX was instated, but there's still work to do. Sexual harassment still impedes students from a safe and fair education. Women are still overrepresented in lowerpaying "**pink-collar**" jobs and underrepresented in tech and academia. Women's athletic teams still receive a smaller percentage of recruiting and athletic operating dollars. Pregnant and parenting students are often steered toward less rigorous schools.

AAUW Austin was well represented as AAUW advocates convened on Washington D.C. for the 2017 National Convention. State President, Pam Wolfe, new Austin VP Membership, Dr. Linda Welsh, Dr. Delia Quintanilla, and Austin/ Georgetown Dual member Pat Rehm joined the 700 plus advocates who converged on Capitol Hill to visit our senators and representatives.

The Texas delegation met with George Leonardo of Senator Cornyn's office and Ariel Gordon in Senator Cruz's office. The group then split up and went to various representatives' offices for scheduled meetings. The two issues that were shared with the government officials were:

- The need to continue to support enforcement of Title IX with funding for the Department of Education's Office of Civil Rights https://www2.ed.gov/about/offices/list/ ocr/index.html
- Proposed ways to address student debt (\$1.3 trillion) and its disproportional impact on women (2/3rds of the debt). We shared the new report, Deeper in Debt: Women and Student Loans http://www.aauw.org/research/deeperin-debt/

My biggest highlight of the convention was shaking the hand of the Associate Justice of the Supreme Court, Sonia Sotomayor! (https://www.biography.com/people/soniasotomayor-453906) Justice Sotomayor roamed the hall while being interviewed by our new AAUW CEO Kimberly Churches as a part of the Friday night banquet. Continued...... National AAUW Convention Report – thanks to Linda Welsh, et al.

The opening session with Judy Woodruff (http://convention.aauw.org/2017/02/01/judy-woodruff-notdeterred-but-determined/) kicked off the conference, sharing her experience and perspective of a journalist in this post-fact age.

The 2017 AAUW Alumnae Recognition award went to Tererai Trent, Ph.D., who was an international fellow in 2001-02: http://convention.aauw.org/2017/02/14/2017-aauw-alumnae-recognition-awardee-tererai-trent/. She shared her inspiring story of commitment to education against all odds.

Two pollsters and political strategists shared their perspectives on polling and the current political climate at another session - one Republican, Linda DiVall (http://convention.aauw.org/2017/05/02/the-woman-behind-big-gop-names-linda-divall/) and one Democrat, Celinda Lake

(http://convention.aauw.org/2017/02/10/a-womans-place-is-in-the-house-and-senate-thanks-tocelinda-lake/). Two big issues this past election were the economy and student debt. People are concerned with careers with potential for the future, not jobs. Another area of interest was research to give women the confidence to vote differently than their spouses. They both emphasized that the language we use is so important; for example, "debt-free college" does not play well, but "college without debt" is viewed positively. Go figure! The recommendation from the two pollsters was to work at the state and local level to promote change.

At the 45th anniversary of Title IX, it was fitting that the 2017 Eleanor Roosevelt award winner, SurvJustice, Inc.'s CEO and Founder Laura L. Dunn, J.D. (http://convention.aauw.org/2017/04/06/2017-eleanor-roosevelt-fund-awardee-survjustice/) exemplified why it is so needed. As a survivor of sexual violence, she shared her story of seeking justice for her rape at the University of Wisconsin when she was a sophomore and the lack of justice in all avenues she pursued. This experience changed the course of her life; she went to law school and then immediately upon graduation founded SurvJustice, a national not-for-profit that provides legal services to victims of sexual violence.

As VP for Membership, I attended 4 workshops: 1) Using the Identity Wheel to Build Welcoming and Inclusive Spaces, which focused on creating a welcoming environment by becoming aware of the identities in one's branch – this includes both personal identity (e.g. critical life experiences, hobbies, personality traits) and social identity (e.g. health and ability, age, SES, gender); 2) The AAUW Recruitment Cook-off: What are the Ingredients for Success, which focused on recruiting new members. The number one motivation for joining AAUW is support for the mission; 3) Exposing Your Hidden Superpowers: Engagement and Retention – One idea that I want to explore from this workshop is gathering at local watering holes for open discussions on current topics; and 4) Inside Look: Programs that Work – One-key take-away was how to frame the AAUW elevator speech:

# AAUW is changing the climate for women and girls.

**Pat Rehm** reports: The highlights of the convention in D. C. for me included all the keynote speakers, but especially Judy Woodruff from the PBS Newshour and Supreme Court Justice Sonia Sotomayor - both of whom I admire tremendously. Also, Lobby Day was well organized, even down to group T-shirts, which provided an inclusiveness for our pre-arranged visit to our state legislators on Capitol Hill. I gleaned many helpful ideas and information in the workshops and daily dialogues that I attended, and I'm enthusiastic about sharing them.

And Delia Quintanilla exclaimed: It was great fun!!!

#### "Texas Two-Stepping to a Better World: A Celebration of Citizen Diplomacy"

GlobalAustin, with partners across Texas, is excited to announce the *Diplomacy Begins Here* regional summit on September 19, 2017. The summit will focus on how international issues affect Texas and how local citizens effectively represent Texas and the United States as they engage in business, culture and sports. Come to exchange ideas and perspectives, one handshake at a time!

The partners include the San Antonio Council for International Visitors, the Dallas World Affairs Council, Global North Texas, and the El Paso Council for International Visitors. The summit is partially funded by a grant from the U.S. Department of State and will be held in the Legislative Conference Center in the Texas State Capitol.

In addition to attracting an audience of political, community and business leaders interested in global issues, we will be making a special effort to include youth through "**Diplomacy Simulation**" sessions designed to expand not only their knowledge of international affairs and international careers, but also basic skills in negotiation, conflict mitigation, communication and teamwork.

Dr. William Charles Inboden, Executive Director, Clements Center for National Security, at The University of Texas at Austin, will be the summit's keynote speaker. Congressman Joaquin Castro will open the summit. Panel discussions focus on trade diplomacy: A Case Study on NAFTA; Immigration in the Age of Innovation; Citizen Diplomacy in the Age of Global Business; Sports Diplomacy: Compassion & Understanding on and off the Field; Tweets, Trolls & Trade: A Citizen Diplomat in the Information Age; and Youth Voices in the Global Community.

The summit concludes with a celebration of citizen diplomacy, at an iconic Austin venue, featuring Cultural Ambassadors Gina Chavez and Greg Engle!
