JANUARY 10 BRANCH MEETING WILL BE AT THE GIRLSTART STEM CENTER LOCATED AT 1400 WESTANDERSON LANE

The January 10 branch meeting features a breakfast buffet and a panel discussion of "Challenges, Strengths in Austin Public Schools Today" by three experts on the topic. Michael P. O'Malley, Ed.D. is Chair and Associate Professor in the Department of Counseling, Leadership, Adult Education, and School Psychology at Texas State University in San Marcos. A former secondary school teacher, assistant principal for academic affairs, and principal, Dr. O'Malley earned his doctorate in education from Saint Joseph's University, Philadelphia, and holds degrees in philosophy and theology. Jennifer Griffis is program manager at Communities in Schools which is a dropout prevention program. Through campus-based programs and special projects, Communities In Schools creates a network of volunteers, social services, businesses, and community resources that work together to break down barriers and help students succeed. And the formula works: last year, 99% of the students intensively served by Communities In Schools stayed in school. The third panelist is Janie Ruiz who is principal of AISD's Gullett Elementary School and has been with the district since 1989. This program

Alma Adams, endorsed by NWPC, ran in a special election in North Carolina's 12th District and will soon be sworn in as the 100th woman in the U.S. Congress. With eighty women representatives and twenty women senators, we have certainly reached a milestone in our journey for women's political parity. However, the 100 women in Congress constitute only 18.6% of the 100 senators and 435 representatives, leaving us still a far cry from 50/50 political representation.

Speaking of public policy, don't forget to submit your comments and suggestions on the proposed AAUW Public Policy Program (PPP) revisions before the December 5 deadline! As you know, the AAUW Public Policy Program (PPP) establishes our organization's federal action priorities. The feedback of members like you is critical to a successful PPP revision. Your comments and suggestions will be used to shape AAUW's advocacy in the future.



On November 24 Nickelodeon's NICK NEWS producer and crew filmed an episode in Austin about Title IX, featuring our AAUW Title IX champions-Kavya, Priya, Smrithi, and Maanasa. The producers had contacted AAUW in Washington, D.C., and were referred by Lisa Goodnight, senior media relations and marketing outreach associate, to AAUW Austin and these girls. Just like when we had short notice that we were hosting House Speaker Nancy Pelosi's visit to Austin, it was necessary to make arrangements to host the film crew very quickly.



Once again we were able to turn to ACC and our members who work there; **Soon Merz** arranged for the use of a classroom in the ACCelerator (the nation's largest learning lab) at ACC Highland Campus.* The girls' parents quickly invited family, friends, and members of the girl scout troop in which Kavya Ramamoorthy and Priya Ramamoorthy did their Girl Scout Gold Award Projects, also about Title IX.** Branch members **Lilac Bauer**, **Anita Knigh**t, and **Mary Ellen Scribner** plus some ACC students and staff completed a very respectable audience for the NICK NEWS filming.

Austin AAUW is proud to be associated with the message of empowerment these young women are sending to the world. AAUW as a whole continues in its public policy program to advocate:

Protection of programs that meet the needs of girls and women in elementary, secondary, and postsecondary education, including strong promotion of STEM education and comprehensive sex education and vigorous enforcement of Title IX and all other civil rights laws pertaining to education rights.
