Texas KIDS COUNT Director to Speak at September 21st Program

"We stand for telling the truth. Respectfully but with courage. And we mean the whole truth based on hard facts and rigorous analysis," is the policy and the practice of the Center for Public Policy Priorities http://www.cppp.org/. In the area of child well-being, Frances Deviney, Ph.D., is responsible for finding the hard facts and applying rigorous analysis to them. She joined the center in 2005. As KIDS COUNT Director, she tracks the status of child well-being in Texas by collecting and analyzing state and county-level data. She also helps coordinate the center's family economic security work. Before coming to the center, she was a research specialist at the Southwest Educational Development Laboratory, a legislative director in



the Texas House of Representatives, and a research analyst at the Families and Schools Together (FAST Track) Project. She earned a Bachelor of Arts in psychology from Vanderbilt University in 1993 and a doctorate in developmental psychology from The University of Utah in 2002.

Dr. Deviney will provide a brief overview of the work of the CPPP and then go into more detail about the Texas KIDS COUNT initiative which provides data on more than seventy measures of child well-being and is a resource to help create, implement, and encourage good policy and effective services to better the lives of Texas children.

This meeting will be at the LCRA's beautiful Redbud Center located at 3601 Lake Austin Blvd. It is easily reached traveling on MOPAC from the north or south (exit Lake Austin Blvd.), and there is ample parking. We will gather at 9:45 a.m. to sign in and pick up name tags; the program begins at 10 a.m. followed by a short business meeting (2013-2014 Branch budget to be adopted) and lunch (depending on the weather, those who wish may enjoy their lunch at outdoor tables on the terrace).

AAUW Texas, Austin & Georgetown Branches Host "When Women Succeed, America Succeeds" with Nancy Pelosi

When AAUW National asked if AAUW Texas and the Austin and Georgetown Branches could host congressional leader Nancy Pelosi in Austin on Women's Equality Day (August 26), AAUW Texas President **Jeanne Best** and Austin Branch President **Anita Knight** got busy. Branch member **Linda Young** who is also president of the National Women's Political Caucus and an ACC staff member joined the effort, and it was quickly decided to hold the event at the ACC Eastview Campus.

"When Women Succeed, America Succeeds," a women's economic agenda discussion with Congresswoman Nancy Pelosi was an appropriate and successful way to mark the day which recognizes when the nineteenth amendment was added to the U.S. Constitution, guaranteeing women the right to vote. The crowd of about two hundred attending the event included many AAUW Austin Branch members, an equal number of ACC personnel, local political leaders and activists, plus a generous media representation.

The Austin American-Statesman. said of the event, "U.S. Rep.
