
Youngsters Get Daily Supervised Care

Chalmers Nursery Cares For Children of Working Mothers

Working mothers of Austin who are having the problem of finding competent help to care for their children during working hours, will find an answer to this need in the **Chalmers Nursery school**, a com-munity supported institution, locat-ed in the federal housing project for white people in Austin. The school opens at 7:30 a. m. and closes at 6:30 p. m. each day except Sun-day.

This nursery school was original-ly set up by the Austin branch of the American Association of Uni-versity Women in cooperation with the works progress administration. The Austin merchants, city officials, the Austin merchants, city officials, the Austin Housing authority, the community chest and others gave the most assistance. The Austin public schools are the legal spon-sor of the nursery. Dr. Bernice M. Moore, who has been very active in the organization of this project, is chairman of the sub-committee on nursery schools of the family security committee, war service di-vision, Austin defense council. The program as worked out for the nursery school is designed to give the maximum of care to the pupils, and at the same time to provide the parents with confi-dence that the children are not be-ing neglected. Beginning at 7:30 each morning, except Sunday, the school opens with the usual inspec-tion procedure. Every Monday morning health examinations are given by the well baby conference. Training as well as play is offer-ed. Art, story-telling, supervised play, good food and rest periods are provided. Meals Served Regular meals are served as fol-lows: breakfast, morning lunch, luncheon, afternoon lunch and sup-per. Well-balanced menus are served.
