

Travis County Bookmobile Arrives

Austin Branch. American Association of University Women, last week proudly announced the rounding of another milestone in a journey begun 26 years ago.

The milestone was the arrival of the \$7,250 bookmobile which will take free library service to the farthest corners of Travis County.

The sleek yellow truck will be shown to AAUW members at their general meeting Wednesday at Calea-ieum Auditorium. Thursday and Friday it will be on display in downtown Austin. AAUW has invited everyone to inspect it.

The bookmobile project actually began for AAUW about four years ago when the 1947-48 future project committee selected it as a suitable undertaking for the branch. But in the thinking of most members the history goes much farther back. It was at an AAUW meeting in the fall of 1925 that Mrs. Grace Delano Clark suggested that the association consider the establishment of a public library as a goal.

Fifteen months later the first Austin Public Library was opened in an upstairs room at Ninth and Congress. It had 500 books, the nucleus for the present-day 75,000-volume collection.

Within the next two years the library became a city project, and in 1928 money was voted to erect a building at Ninth and Guadalupe, the present site.

People now living who were on this first library board are Mesdames Charles Stevenson, W. T. Caswell, Claude Hill, Hubert Jones, W. T. Mather, Ben H. Powell, Arnold Romberg, Aaron Schaffer, Lomis Slaughter, E. J. Villavaso, Miss Margaret Robinson, Judge Charles Black, H. H. Luedecke, F. W. Sternenberg, W. J. Weeg, Douglas Weeks and E. W. Winkler.

The library was operated entirely with city funds until 1937 when, in the interest of economy and efficiency, the City of Austrn and Travis County developed a cooperative library pregram.

Since then Travis County citizens have been entitled to book cards at the Public Library. Actually few county residents have been able to avail themselves of the privilege because of the distance of the library from their homes. For the vast majority of county children a visit to the library during National Book Week in November has had to suffice.

It was this obvious gap in service that inspired AAUW members to adopt during the 1947-48 year the securing of a bookmobile as a project.

Mrs. A. H. Neighbors was chairman of the project committee that year. Working with her in making an extensive investigation of county library needs were Mesdames J. R. Davis, L. B. Ezell. Tom Lemon and J. G. Umstattd.

County commissioners became interested in the project and agreed to set aside funds to operate the bookmobile if AAUW would purchase it.

By February of this year \$2,300, saved from the profits of the annual children's play series, was available. It was not nearly enough, but AAUW members were afraid that delay might be fatal. The national emergency threatened immediate critical shortages of materials for such vehicles. The impatience of many members was expressed by Miss Katherine Cook who said, "Some of the young people for whom we intended the bookmobile in 1947 are already adults."

Thus in March, 1931, the bookmobile became a county-wide undertaking. AAUW members started going over the county, speaking to P-TAs and at schools, Businesses, clubs and individuals were canvassed. AAUW itself gave a benefit game party in the spring.

Through the hot summer the work continued. The result is


