Professor Suri is the author and editor of nine books on contemporary politics and foreign policy. His most recent book is Liberty's Surest Guardian: American Nation-Building from the Founders to Obama. Why was "philanthropy" removed from the mission statement in the new AAUW strategic plan? Why change our mission?

At the June 2018 Board meeting, the AAUW Board unanimously approved the new strategic plan presented by the Strategic Planning Task Force. This included a new mission statement, vision statement and values for the organization. The Task Force, made up of member leaders and others, also did an external analysis of other organizations working on gender equity to ensure areas where AAUW can continue to be distinct and differentiated in pursuit of its mission. One major change was the reorganization of what we do. AAUW has always been grounded in nonpartisan principles and facts, as well as a commitment to robust research. Therefore, the new mission statement – to advance gender equity for women and girls through research, education and advocacy – places research first in order. However, one noun philanthropy – has been removed from the mission statement. Why? While we remain committed as AAUW members to support our mission through our endowed and annual fellowships and grants, others outside see "philanthropy" and assume we are an operating foundation. Meaning, we don't seek or need contributions or donations for our work. The intention of our philanthropy is to continue to help women and girls with their education, whether through branch scholarships, graduate fellowships or grants. The noun "education" encompasses this intent without confusing outside potential members or donors. But, our commitment to supporting women and girls continues in perpetuity.

Throughout the summer months, your AAUW Austin Board and the Finance Committee have been working hard to develop plans and a budget for the coming year. My thanks to both last and this year's board members and to my finance committee: Elaine Penn, Joyce Pulich, Mary Ellen Scribner, Anita Knight, Marina Rivers, Marsha Endahl Kramer, Kathy Robertson and Jackie Hardee.

Last year, the decision was made to reduce the program meal cost charged to members. The potential shortfall was underwritten by the previous year's net gain. However, those monies were never needed. Programs ended the year at basically a break-even. Once again the Board proposes to keep lunch costs at \$25.00 per person, which potentially could lead to a shortfall. Additionally the Public Policy team is proposing a special Title IX training project.
