Past, Present and Future Tense: AAUW Austin Celebrates 95 Years
Past presidents from the last five decades will tell it like it was.

In recent years many of us have had our DNA analyzed in an effort to learn more about our pasts and perhaps understand our futures a little better. That is just what we will do for the Branch at this meeting as we mark the ninety-five years since the Branch was organized by 15 women meeting at the Driskill Hotel in November of 1923. Past president Judy Reinhart (1999-2000) will give a brief summary of the very early years and facilitate a panel of past branch presidents in remembering some of AAUW Austin's greatest moments, members and accomplishments. Centenarian Kay Goodwin, who was president from 1971-73, will share her memories of the Branch from the 1970s. Ervalyn McVeigh (1992-93) will look back on the '80s. Immediate past AAUW Texas president and 1998-99 Branch president Pam Wolfe will sum up the nineties for us. Elizabeth Newell (2000-2001) will move us into the 21st Century. Immediate past president Mary Ellen Scribner (2017-18) will sum up the present decade, look to the future, and present a certificate to current co-presidents Elaine Penn and Joyce Pulich from National, recognizing the Branch for its ninety-five years of advancing gender equity for women and girls through research, education, philanthropy and advocacy. This is a very special celebration of our Branch and its many members over the years, so you may want to wear a vintage hat, an AAUW scarf, etc., to mark the occasion. Everyone is encouraged to wear her AAUW pins including year pins, legacy circle pin, Sister of Ann pin, or past officer and service pins.

AAUW Wine Tasters

The newest AAUW interest group, AAUW Wine Tasters (working name) met at Sandi Sykora's home for a Sauvignon Blanc tasting and initial planning for the group.

The group will have a *tasting and educational focus*. For this first meeting, wine expert and tasting guide *lan Holm-Hansen from The Austin Wine Merchant* truly elevated the evening. He grouped the bottles by region. In general, the New Zealand Sauvignon Blancs from Marlborough tasted brighter, tangier and livelier than those from California. The Napa and Sonoma county wines were described as creamier, smoother, textured, minerally, more austere. The CA wines had a lower acidity and a higher alcohol content. All of the wines we tasted would pair well with foods with citrus elements, or fried foods; in harmony or as a balancing contrast.

Interestingly, the group was evenly split with half favoring New Zealand wines vs. California. It was a revelation and a delight to find Sauvignon Blancs for every palette. Here's a brief summary of the wines.
