The Bylaws Committee (**Pam Wolfe, Janie Maldonado** and **Carol Midboe**) recently reviewed the Austin Bylaws (2016) and determined a few updates are needed. (These proposed bylaws changes are attached to the email with this newsletter.)

The primary focus of the review was **Article X. Officers. Section 4.**Several years ago, our branch went from having one term to two terms. At the time we did not have "Co-Executive Officers." Times have changed and the schedule of when executive officers will be replaced is no longer valid. Now it is more important that we have staggered terms, so we do not have two new co-officers beginning their term at the same time. MORE Women in Action

Moving from Southern California to Austin in May of 2016, **Roberta Coffin** is currently completing her two-year term as Treasurer of the Austin Branch. She also assists with various STEM undertakings and is a member of several interest groups. A relative late-comer to AAUW, she joined the Tustin (CA) branch in 2011 and quickly became involved in Tech Trek, a math/science camp program for seventh grade girls. She went on to head up several committees and served on the Tustin (CA) branch board in various positions, including that of president. She also served for four years as a member of the AAUW California Branch Support team, working with the Orange County Inter-Branch Council and 12 local branches under that umbrella. In that capacity, she organized three region-wide Job-Alike Training Days, as well as served on the AAUW CA's marketing committee. A marketing communications consultant and digital marketing strategist, with a B.A. degree from U. of CA Irvine, Roberta was the owner/principal of an Orange County (CA) advertising/public relations agency for 25+ years. In both Southern California and in Austin, she has continued to be actively involved in several professional organizations and various non-profits.

Jackie Hardee is a native Texan who was born on the Texas coast, but moved to the Austin area in 1970. She attended high school in South Austin, then went to the University of Texas to earn her BS in Civil Engineering. She later took night classes at Southwest Texas State University (now Texas State University) in San Marcos where she was awarded an MBA with honors. As an engineer, Jackie worked for 27 years with the Texas Department of Water Resources (now the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality), and was one of the first female employees who worked for this agency to receive a Professional Engineering license. Before retiring in 2010, she was Division Director for Waste Permits and managed the administration of programs associated with low level radioactive waste, municipal solid waste, and underground injection wells. As a volunteer, Jackie has mentored eighth graders in mathematics, planted trees in state parks, helped in political campaigns, and became a Volunteer Deputy Registrar (VDR) in various Texas counties to help individuals get registered to vote. After joining AAUW in 2016, she got involved with the STEM committee, Creative Stitchery, and the Hiking Group. Eager to get involved, she offered to assist the finance officer of the Austin branch, Roberta Coffin, and worked with Linda Welsh, the Membership VP. In her spare time, Jackie enjoys quilting, geocaching, reading, kayaking, international travel, and playing Maj Jongg with friends. When the opportunity arises, she likes to combine some of these interests, like when she got to play Maj Jongg in Xian, China. Now that her husband of 35 years, Robert More, has retired, she's looking forward to visiting national parks in the US and hiking segments of the Camino de Santiago (also known as the Way of Saint James) in Spain.

Nancy Andren was born and raised in California. She has a BS in Mathematics from the University of Redlands in California and an MLIS from UT Austin. She worked as a software engineer at Rockwell International before having 2 sons. She lived in Austin from 1987-1995 where she went back to school to get the library degree. She worked as a reference librarian at the Texas State Library, ACC, MCLIS (a library cooperative in Los Angeles), and at community colleges in California. Retired to Big Bear Lake, in the mountains of Southern California before moving back to Austin in 2018. She has been a member of AAUW since 1975 in California and Texas. In California, she was the state project co-coordinator for Tech Trek Math & Science camps for girls from 2007-2012. She has been a dorm mom at Tech Trek camps for over 10 years and was a camp director for 3 years. Branches she has belonged to include: Placentia-Yorba Linda, Austin, Big Bear Valley and again Austin. She enjoys hiking, reading and doing Tai Chi.

In the 116th Congress, there are 126 women serving; 47 are women of color. Women now make up 23% of Congress, up from 20.6% in 2018. In the Senate there are 24 women serving. In the House, the freshman class of women is now 36, largest ever. A record 102 women won their races; the previous high was 85 in 2016. Iowa elected its first women reps; 4 states have never been represented by a woman: Alaska, Mississippi, N. Dakota and Vermont. Newly elected from Texas are Veronica Escobar, Lizzie Pannill Fletcher, and Sylvia Garcia. Nine women now serve as governors - first time in 3 states: Maine, S. Dakota and Iowa.
