<u>NO SMALL MATTERS</u>: Introduction of Scholarship recipients, Named Gift Awardees, <u>and</u>...... "Early Childhood Development 78 years after AAUW-Austin Founded Chalmers Nursery School"

Join us to learn how early childhood education has changed in the 78 years since our predecessors in AAUW-Austin helped start the Chalmers Nursery School (now called Mainspring Schools) – the first nursery school in the country located within low income housing. It is one of Austin's leading early childhood centers for at-risk children and their families.

Our VP Membership **Linda Welsh** will share the history of Mainspring Schools and AAUW's connection to the school. Sue Carpenter, Chief Programs Officer for United Way for Greater Austin, will give an overview of the current community conditions for early childhood education in the Austin area, followed by Jason Gindele, the new Executive Director of Mainspring Schools, sharing the business of early childhood and the challenges faced to offer high quality education and care given the limited sources of funding.

Ms. Carpenter provides support and leadership to the Success By 6, Family Economic Success and Navigation Center teams. She has devoted over 30 years of her professional experience to non-profit work, with an emphasis in early childhood care and education issues.

Prior to joining the Mainspring staff in 2017, Jason spent more than 20 years in digital media, leading startup and mid-sized business initiatives across multiple industries. Jason was both a parent and board member at Mainspring before making the career change.
