Eva Peron: the Argentine Rainbow By Dr. Martha Wofford

Eva Duarte Peron was born and lived in a time of political upheaval in a country historically KNOWN for its instability. That background—as well as her marriage to Argentina's notorious president Juan Peron—gave her an "edge" and a ferocity that few women can claim. But it was her childhood poverty that made her want to lift others, especially women and children, out of misery. She became an icon known as "The Argentine Rainbow"—a sign of hope for those who'd never known hope.

The Eva Peron lecture is one of 12 lectures in UT's Lifelong Learning Institute's "Bad Girls" seminars. The 11 women of the series are not "bad" in the traditional way we understand the word, but "bad with a wink." They all had their dark sides, but in the end, their accomplishments made them stand out as people of vision and worthy of our esteem.

Three of our members contributed 9 hours of their time to Girlstart's DeSTEMber Extravaganza. If you have not participated in any of these fun volunteer events, you are missing out.

Girlstart reports that they are serving more than 3000 girls per semester in their after-school program. Also, from analysis by Director **Tamara Hudgins**, girls who attended Girlstart After School exceeded in the numbers that received National Honor Society membership at East View High School in Georgetown.

Latinitas is among the six organizations that will be honored at an award ceremony during SXSW for their commitment to community service. Women in Action



AAUW American Fellowship alumna Rachael Rollins this year become the first woman elected district attorney in Suffolk County (which includes Boston) and the first woman of color to hold that job in Massachusetts. She also fought for women's futures by defending Title IX as a college student over 20 years ago.

As college lacrosse players, Rollins and her teammates retained a lawyer after her university tried to cut their winning program ... but not the losing men's football team. They won their case, since Title IX stipulates that federally funded institutions are legally required to provide students with equitable sports opportunities.

In the #MeToo era, Title IX also ensures the rights of sexual assault survivors in federally supported educational programs. Yet, unbelievably, U.S. Secretary of Education Betsy DeVos last year proposed a rule that would make it harder for students to come forward while making it easier for schools to evade accountability.

Our supporters' response was swift and overwhelming. More than 100,000 people submitted comments about this unfair rule, including many from AAUW.

But we must keep fighting until this dreadful proposal is reversed. With you on our side, we will. We've worked too long and too hard to accept anything less than full protection against sex discrimination in all areas of education.


