

Congratulations to the newly elected 2020-2022 AAUW Texas Board!

(Voting was conducted by a survey through Constant Contact or by paper ballot. There were 287 electronic votes and 2 votes by mail.)

President Gloria Long, Program VP Melodia Gutierrez, Fund VP Margie Poole, Membership VP Barbara Cager, Finance Officer Diane Roberts, Secretary Mary Smith, and our Central District Rep Marsi Liddell

Over 70 members of AAUW-TX branches, including about 15 Austin members, donated \$100 or more to the AAUW greatest needs fund this year to be named "AAUW-TX Sister Suffragists".

Austin branch is one of 11 that has achieved the MAP award for Membership, Advocacy and Philanthropy. We are also one of the top 10 branches for Funds contributions both by dollar amount (#3) and per capita (#10) in 2018, and also #3 by dollar amount in 2019. Thanks everyone!
