# PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Thank you! Thanks to all of you for being part of our Austin Branch and a special thanks to the volunteers whose many contributions keep us going. We are so fortunate to have this community and this group of dedicated individuals. It has been hard on our planners — wanting to meet in person but also remembering to be cautious on behalf on others.

Given this opportunity to be reflective, I want to remind you of the 100th anniversary on August 18 (for the ratification) and on August 26 (for certification) of the 19<sup>th</sup> Amendment to the U.S. Constitution and of a promise to women of the right to vote. We know that there is more work to be done concerning equal opportunity — and not only for women. Please continue to do what you can in your daily life to advance this pursuit.

Next, I want to share an excerpt from a recent message sent from AAUW's National Board. The following text highlights one reason why AAUW has been criticized as being structurally racist:

Yet there is more we must do. That's why I'm challenging you to reflect on what you can do as AAUW members — individually and collectively — to make a difference. For example, you have the power to reimagine what it means to be an AAUW member, beginning with our educational degree requirement. As we strive to be inclusive of all women's lives and experiences, the time has more than come to let go of this unnecessary prerequisite while continuing to embrace education as a central and lasting part of our mission.

Please be thinking about this challenge. I expect that we will be voting about it as an association. Previously when we voted on giving up the requirement for a bachelor's degree, I did not consider that it could be viewed as racist. Like you, I have promised to be a life-long learner and I keep finding that there is a lot to learn.

Meanwhile, back to the work of our branch, if you would be glad to share your talents but no one has asked, please volunteer yourself. We would like to have members in training for every leadership position. If you see a place to help, please contact the VP or chair of that area of activity, Evelyn or me. We have two specific requests for assistance.

- The web/PR team would welcome another member especially for content and feedback.
- It would be great to have someone willing to work with our financial team with the idea of one day serving as treasurer. I hear that a "... working knowledge of accounting principles and of QuickBooks or other accounting software would be preferred."

# **Partner Highlight**



The Austin Branch of AAUW has a long history of supporting access to high quality early childhood programs. In 1941, as its annual civic project, the Austin Branch committed to support a nursery school. Working with the Works Progress Administration (WPA), AAUW agreed to supervise the program and provide the supplies, equipment and food. Newspaper articles from the time announced the opening of what was then known as the Chalmers Nursery School, in the White Housing Center of Chalmers Court on East 3rd Street. The program opened on October 15 of that year. Branch budget records from the time included items such as painting toys for \$1.40 and laundry for \$3.26. The rent was a whopping \$7.90 per month. It is clear that AAUW members were staunch supporters and contributed a great deal to the early success of the nursery school.

From its beginnings as an "all white" nursery school, the school has evolved and expanded its reach to serve children that reflect our diverse community. AAUW has also evolved in its commitment to equitable access to high quality early childhood experiences for ALL children.

Through many name and location changes, our branch continues to support the work of Mainspring School. **Janie Maldonado** was the liaison with Mainspring for many years. Kudos to Janie for her long-term commitment and support of the school. **Linda Welsh** is the incoming liaison for Mainspring. # Summer



**Girlstart** held their summer camps virtually. Everything that a camper needed to participate was delivered to her door, safely, well ahead of the beginning of camp. There were morning and afternoon sessions via video conference with the Girlstart staff as well as breakout sessions for activities. Each girl received a 56-page 'Courage to Create' engineering journal. In the journal, the campers responded to writing and reflection prompts, as well as recorded their data from activities and experiments. The last week of camp ran July 27 to 31.

Every girl who participated in camp received, for technology activities, an Ozobot robot to keep. Those girls who did not have a dedicated piece of technology received a device to keep.

So how can we help? **Girlstart** changed their Send a Girl to Camp campaign into Send Camp to a Girl. <u>Click here to donate</u> Help them reach their goal.

**Girlstart** will continue to offer virtual camps to the girls in the school districts it serves. They are also holding their popular starry nights virtually.

**Latinita's** spring conference was held virtually on July 18. More than 40 girls participated in the challenges of the day which included addressing Covid19's effect on underrepresented and underfunded communities of color across the US with an emphasis on technology disparities. Facilitated by volunteer mentors from tech companies and professionals across Austin, the girls used Mural (an online brainstorming platform) to share ideas, addressing access to technology, food insecurity, and distracted learning. The lunchtime speaker was Esmeralda Marrero, an IT Specialist/Project Manager with the U.S. Army Medical Department Center and School. The last camp of the summer will be Media Chica for girls from ages 14 -18. It will be held virtually from August 3 to 8. The camp is free. The future of **Club Latinitas at Home** depends on what AISD will be doing concerning on-campus afterschool activities. If only at-



# In Memoriam

**Dr. Jenny Lind Porter Scott**, was born in Fort Worth, Texas, on September 3rd 1927 to Drue J. and Josephine Trammell Porter. Dr. Porter was an author, educator, member of the Texas Women's Hall of Fame and a Texas Poet Laureate. She was a fifth generation

Texan and earned both her B.A. & M.A. from Texas Christian University,

a Ph.D. in Philosophy from The University of Texas at Austin, an honorary doctorate from the University of Free Asia (1970), and a Distinguished Diploma of Honor from Pepperdine University (1979). Dr. Porter was the Professor of English at West Texas State University from 1959-1961. Dr. Porter published numerous poems and books. This earned her prestigious awards from the Poetry Society of America (1940), and the Texas Institute of Letters (2000). Dr. Porter also earned the title of Poet Laureate of Texas (1964) and induction into the Texas Women's Hall of Fame (1985).

Her works include: El Sol Colorado: Together with his friends, six men as individual and brilliant as he (The saga of John O. Meusebach in early Texas), Three Dramatic Monologues: Da Vinci, Michelangelo, Rembrandt by Jenny Lind Porter 1978.

Dr. Porter and her husband, Lawrence E. Scott founded the Texas Poets' Corner — The Jenny Lind Porter Collections in the Cornette Library at West Texas A& M; established a Creative Writing program at Huston-Tillotson University; named a Piper Professor (top ten outstanding college professions of Texas) by the Piper Foundation in 1976. She and her husband were also patrons of the O. Henry Museum, helping it to acquire and publish an unknown O. Henry children's story. Dr. Porter was the niece of O. Henry, a popular author of South and Central Texas short stories.

Dr. Porter is preceded in death by her beloved husband Lawrence Scott. She is survived by her two stepchildren Barbara Scott Goudy, and John Lawrence Scott and his wife Jan; plus seven grandchildren Johnnie Scott, Kevin Scott, Daniel Scott, Christopher Scott, Kayla Patterson and Bill Frederick and Yvonne Hersh. Other survivors are nieces Carol Coulson, Cynthia Wright and Candice Curry, and her sister-in-law Ernestine Porter.

Dr. Porter was known for her gentle yet fiercely independent resolve. She took great pride in her academic studies and literature achievements. She poured her heart and soul into her role as professor to over 10,000 students over her lifetime.

One of her favorite passions was telling stories about Texas, the siege of the Alamo, it's many historical heroes. She also loved animals of all kinds, especially her cat and poodle. Her faith remained strong throughout her lifetime, as she was well-versed in the teachings of the Bible. She is remembered for being an exceptional person, open-minded and full of vivacious optimism. She is buried at the Texas State Cemetery 909 Navasota Street, Austin, Texas.
